Pastor's Page — Faith Practices



Keeping faith alive is what faith practices do. They are outward signs and sometimes inward lifelines to a living, authentic faith. Sometimes they are shared, public actions as the result of people coming together. Other times they are private, soul searching meditations in which we engage as individuals. They are as ancient as the most ancient of human beings and so new that they continue to be discovered and draw us in the future.

As a community faith practices bring us together for worship, prayer, song, Holy Communion, Holy Baptism, funerals, retreats, Bible study, theological study and discussion, service, and shared meals. Individually faith practices sustain us through private prayer, service, music, meditation, art, journaling, spiritual retreat and intentional silence. It's important that we encourage one another to practice and live out our faith in old and new ways. When we are feeling spiritually drained or empty inviting the Holy Spirit to enliven us with a tangible way to express and live our faith is an important step. Consider these examples of faith practices and see if they might be a springboard to something new for you.

This month we, at Grace, will once again participate in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) churchwide day of service, "God's Work Our Hands." In the past we have done projects at Chintimini Park, the Corvallis waterfront River Park, Avery Park and Garfield Elementary School. This year we will be working at Lincoln Elementary School. (See detailed information elsewhere in this issue of Grace Gatherings.) Though many of us practice our faith by engaging in various service projects throughout the year, this is a way to make a corporate, visible expression that Grace Lutheran and the whole denomination to which we belong, the ELCA, is a church outwardly focused on service to others.

Many years ago at Grace, some of the women of this congregation, made Chrismons (monograms and symbols for Christ) to decorate the sanctuary Christmas tree. One might consider the discipline and craftiness of having made those decorations a faith practice. Through the years as we have continued to use those decorations, those who decorate or un-decorate the tree share in that practice by reflecting upon the meaning of these ancient symbols.

In the past when I served a rural congregation in Idaho, I had an opportunity to preside over the baptism of three siblings on the same day. Following that the family established a delightful faith practice which involved me. On the anniversary of the children's baptism, they would invite me to join them for ice cream to celebrate their baptismal birthdays. It was a wonderful way of nurturing the faith of these children, as a family, by highlighting the significance of their baptismal day. This particular family was great at finding ways to pursue faith practices as a family group.

The above examples of annual practices are faith boosts, yet it's the weekly (Sunday after Sunday) and daily practices in which we engage and discover that truly sustain us. Just as we would be malnourished if we were not able to eat on a regular basis or out-of-shape if we were not able to exercise on a regular basis, we risk becoming spiritually empty without the daily and weekly practices which sustain us.

Personal prayer was referenced above as one individual faith practice among many. This is something in which we can engage daily. We do ourselves a disservice, however, if we think too narrowly about how to engage in prayer. Individual prayer takes many different forms some of which are: centering prayer, lectio divino, visio divino, rosary prayer, daily devotional booklets, silent meditation, written prayer, singing and labyrinth prayer. Did you know that our neighboring congregation, Good Samaritan Episcopal Church, has an outdoor labyrinth accessible to members of the broader community? While it's helpful to establish a prayer routine, we need not punish ourselves if we miss days now and then, or if our routine might be very different and varied compared to another's routine. Be bold this month and ask another about their faith practices or share your faith practice with someone else. Encourage one another. (1 Thessalonians 5:11)

SAFETY POLICY FOR CHLDREN AND ELDERS

Long about the fall of 2008, a group of GELC members began to meet weekly (and sometimes more often) to hammer out one of the most important policies this church has. The Personnel Committee created an intricate, detailed 17-page description of how all people, from toddlers to the elderly, could come to church and be treated with respect. *Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 419B.010.* A was heavily relied on. Another source was the ELCA church policy on healing and renewal.

The 2008 policy was revised and the revision was adopted by the Council on May 13, 2013.

The policy begins with a brief statement of purpose and then moves on to the meaty stuff:

- How paid staff and volunteers who are entrusted with the care and supervision of children/elders, on-site and off sight are screened;
- How a person might be disqualified from service?
- What constitutes a safe environment at Grace Lutheran Church?
- What are the guidelines for staff and volunteers pertaining to their interactions with children/ elders?
- How does one respond to an allegation of abuse?
- How does one respond to the victim of abuse?
- How does one respond to the accused?
- How does the congregation respond to the situation?
- How does the congregation respond to a Sex Offender who, in the future, might wish to attend services and activities at Grace?

Also included on page 9 are the telephone numbers of agencies to whom one would report abuse as well as the DHS website.

A difficult part of the policy to read starts on page 10 with the types of abuse and definitions of Elder Abuse and Neglect, including financial exploitation.

Working on this policy was not an easy task. It was a little depressing to be faced with the negative ways humans can and do choose to relate to others, but we can't stop something if we don't know what to stop. That being said it brings this essay to a conclusion and to telling you readers where you can find our church's Safety Policy so if-you recognize behavior that makes you uncomfortable or concerned you will know what to do about it.

You may request a copy of the Safety Policy either in electronic or hard copy form from the church office. Also, each church council member has a copy of the Safety Policy in their church council notebooks.


