and as our ancestors were liberated from Egypt, so our Earth gasps deeply in her liberation from our oppression

## The Garden which serves the Southside Food Bank needs volunteers and 4" or 6-pack pots



When we are able to return and gather for Sunday Worship and Christian Education, we will start where we left off:



For the past two Church Council meetings of March and April, church council has taken on a new challenge of meeting through Zoom due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Zoom is a relatively new technology (2011) that allows teleconferencing, telecommuting and distance education, whereby those participating in a "conference call" can use their laptop or IPhone and dial into a meeting by invitation of an email....and be able to see each other and talk to one another.

Due to the pandemic, the popularity of Zoom has increased dramatically. On one day in March 2020, the Zoom app was down-

loaded 343,000 times with about 18% of those downloads originating in the United States.



With Zoom being something new to us, the most challenging aspect to church council members has been getting everyone hooked up with video and audio working at the same time. Dave Lundahl has been instrumental in solving many of our technology issues. Thanks also to Dave's account with Zoom through his business that allows us to go beyond the time limit. Use of the platform is free for video conferences of up to 100 participants, with a 40-minute time limit. For longer or larger conferences with more features, paid subscriptions are available, costing \$15–20 per month.

Though Zoom has not been our most desired way to meet and discuss church agenda items "face-to-face", it has been suitable and a very valuable tool in solving and discussing many issues facing the church during this pandemic. It's something too that we will all look back on as a learning experience and be thankful for it being available. We hope that we are back to our regular meetings in the Fireside room soon!

#### **Justice and the Prophets**

By and large, North Americans are dedicated to the proposition that church and state are best kep separate. Many of us agree that the freedom to worship as one pleases is a positive feature of democracy. Unfortunately, the separation of church and state has often led to a split between the values of Christian (and non-Christian) faiths and public policy. For example, political arguments about issues such as food assistance for the poor, justice in the legal system, and immigration rarely reflect the biblical insistence that God's people care for widows, orphans, and aliens. Laws that give economic advantages to the wealthy are forwarded without a hint that the Bible roundly condemns usury, shady business practices, and unjust economic gain.

Ancient Israel's prophets would have had a difficult time comprehending the separation of state and faith. The prophets had much to say about people and political leaders who, on the one hand, declared their fidelity to Yahweh but, on the other hand, violated God's clear will. This fourteen-week study is about the intersection between God's firm intentions and the behavior of God's people.

Most of the following sessions focus on the oracles of Biblical prophets. The prophets are not presented in order of their historical appearance. Instead, the sessions, which follow the Uniform Series lectionary, are organized around variations on the theme of God's justice. Consequently, the study materials include a thumbnail introduction to each prophet's historical context in order to better comprehend the particular warnings or promises forwarded to the prophet's audiences. Nevertheless, and because the prophets conveyed the word of the Lord, their oracles continue to address and challenge contemporary believers.

This series considers the many ways God insisted that ancient people exercise God's justice through their own behavior and policies. That divine insistence persists. God yet calls for justice and compassion. This study encourages us to discern how we might obey that summons.



### Covid-19 scams and fraud

While we live and work through this world we are living in with the Covid-19 pandemic, it probably doesn't surprise us that fear and anxiety are extremely high. With no medicine to treat, or vaccine to prevent, many of us fear going out into our world or being in contact with others who may be carrying the Covid-19 virus. From ads for "miracle drugs to treat Covid-19" and "Get Covid-19 health insurance" to "Get free Covid-19 testing kits", scammers are seeking out individuals who may be looking for additional protection with the Covid-19 virus. For many, we understand that these ads are scams and are looking at getting money or personal information. But for some, who live in fear or with anxiety about Covid-19, these ads may feel like relief from their stress and anxiety and not even realize these are scams. Where some may be able to research these offers, others who do not have access to social media or the internet, may not understand or be able to research these offers... and these are the people who are the most vulnerable to these scams.

Some topics of scammers are including

- Medicare and Insurance
- Cures and treatments for Covid-19
- Vaccines for Covid-19
- Testing Kits
- Government Relief payments

Some important things to remember about identifying if it is a scam or real.

- The Government will not make calls to inform you about payments, insurance, or other information. The IRS, Social Security, and Medicare will always send written letters or documents to tell you what is happening.
- Government relief payments are being mailed out or direct deposited into your account. There is no pick up location or need to give out personal information to somebody on the phone. If you do not have direct deposit, these checks will be mailed to you.
- There is no cure, vaccine, or treatment for Covid-19 at this time. The FDA is working hard to eliminate and stop businesses who are trying to sell products that claim to be a cure or prevention.
- There is no special insurance or supply kits that are being sent out for Covid-19. Do not give any caller your personal information to get additional insurance or testing kits.
- No business will ask for gift cards in payment of a service.

In these times of social distancing, while you are talking to family or reaching out to people in our community who may not have family or may live on their own, touch bases on these scams and make sure that as many people in our community know and will not be a victim. Also, if ever you are questioning a phone call from an agency asking for personal information, always let them know that you will call them back, and look up the actual number and call them back. Never call them back on any special "direct" phone number they may give you from a cold call.







### **Grace Center News**

Even though Grace Center's doors are required to be closed these days, by order of the Department of Human Services (DHS), our staff have developed many ways to reach our participants and caregivers in their homes. That may require the help of Technology, but the Center's loving people bring the human touch with them. Twice a week our nurse makes calls to them, and in an ongoing log keeps their progress notes. Phone calls with individual participants provide counseling services and Grace Center's caregiver support groups meet twice a month through a program called Zoom.

Per DHS's request, we have some staff working with participants who need errands run, medications and hygiene care. Small groups of staff also complete individual tasks spread out at the center, or they develop new activities for the program. They could even make videos for the exciting new YouTube channel! If this sounds like a busy Center, they all meet every Tuesday to connect with one another on Zoom.

The truly new activity going already includes the public as well. There are already over 100 subscribers to Grace Center's YouTube channel so Tera writes, which means we were able to customize our channel link. At this writing there are over 20 videos posted, and more come every week. They cover a range of subjects such as exercises, arts and crafts, or music. Interesting samples include "Sing-a-Long with Jeff Lesmeister", "Hand-weight Exercises", "Flower Arranging", and "A Cooking Class with Chef D".






## **Looking ahead to Pentecost**

#### Sunday, May 31 Day of Pentecost

#### Introduction

Pentecost derives its name from the Jewish festival celebrating the harvest and the giving of the law on Mount Sinai fifty days after Passover. Fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the Holy Spirit as God's presence within and among us. In Acts the Spirit arrives in rushing wind and flame, bringing God's presence to all people. Paul reminds us that though we each have different capacities, we are unified in the Spirit that equips us with these gifts. Jesus breathes the Holy Spirit on his disciples, empowering them to forgive sin. We celebrate that we too are given the breath of the Holy Spirit and sent out to proclaim God's redeeming love to all the world.
