Reformation Sunday

On the last day of October 1517, Martin Luther took the bold and momentous step of declaring his substantial concerns about the Roman Church. He committed what amounted to 'civil disobedience' in those days by nailing his grievances on the wooden door to the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany which was then part of the Holy Roman Empire. The document became know as Luther's 95 Theses. This simple act by this simple Augustinian monk set off a continuing revolution in the Western World about not only the relationships between God and Humankind, the nature of a Good Life, and the precepts of the Roman Church, but perhaps as importantly, the substance and meaning of Social and Personal Revolution. Corruption was so ubiquitous in the Church, even from the Pope Leo X himself, that Martin worried this massive conflict like a dog worries a bone.



To the Church fathers, God's acceptance and justification of Human activity was influenced and judged by how one behaves, acts, and performs during one's life. But to Martin, it was abundantly clear that God's loving Grace is ever present, ever giving, ever available to all who would simply accept and have Faith in it. To come to the eternal presence of God is assured upon one's end of this temporal existence, and made clear by the sacrifice upon the Cross by Jesus, who is the Christ, the Anointed One, the Savior, the Lord, the Son of God. It is that simple, and it is that glorious.

We don't get there by the good works we do; that destination is already assured by God's Grace. To take it one step further, God's Grace provides us with the power and means to actually do these good works. But the gift of Grace is immutable, freely given, eternal. This one fact is what sets aside Lutherans from all other denominations of theological understanding. To accept and to have Faith in this fact is to embrace this Grace, and this in turn frees us from fear, anxiety ... Despair ... and what the Lutheran theologian Sören Kierkegaard calls "Sickness unto Death", drawing from John, 11:4. Freedom from this illness allows each of us to exercise our individual agency in this world, an exercise in response to God's loving Grace. Reformation Sunday is the day set aside, the last day of October each year, as a reminder of our freedom from Sin, and our personal responsibility to recognize this magnificent gift from God ... to Reform our own individual lives in response to God's Grace. This doesn't happen once. This doesn't happen even one hundred times. This happens each and every moment of our temporal lives on this planet as a way of living and breathing and acting within God's Presence. If Sin is "missing the mark", then Reformation is the "redirecting" of our lives on a continuing basis to achieve that "mark".

The key concept here is the concept of Faith. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews, 11:1). This idea, this reality alone is worthy of a lifetime of contemplation. We do not accept this "blindly" as one accepts a cult concept. This is the awareness of eternal possibilities and the expectation of their coming into being. And even more exciting, the awareness of our individual agency in bringing these possibilities into fruition.

So, when I get up in the morning, I pray that I accept God's Grace and act in Faith that my life will proceed in fulfilling God's loving plan for this Cosmos. Thanks be to God.

Pastor Dorthy mentions five focal points to help us through this process; *heritage, leadership, mission, connection and future.* She goes on to say..."Interim-transitional ministry focuses on the unique context, traditions and ministries for the congregation. I do not come with a prescriptive plan for the faith community. Nor do I come with synodical agendas for you. This is a God thing."

We welcome Pastor Dorthy. She will be commuting from Silverton where she lives with her husband, John Dallum and dog Millie. Her schedule in the office at Grace is currently being negotiated.

Adult Bible Study - September 2020

Love for One Another

His hands damp from kneeling before his disciples and washing their feet, Jesus returns to the supper table and tells them, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34).

In Christ we are commanded to love our mothers, our BFFs, the dear couple at church with whom we sit almost every Sunday, and old friends far away. Just as Jesus loved Peter, so we are called to love our family and friends.

And just as Jesus love Judas Iscariot, we are called to love the men who dropped bombs on Damascus and those who shot up Columbine, Virginia Tech, and Parkland schools.

What? I'm not going to love those people.

Just as Jesus loved Thomas, we are called to love the ones who doubt the decisions our pastors and congregational leaders make, organize secret petitions, and announce they'll leave if they don't get their way.

Yes, love them. Just as Jesus loved Judas and Thomas.

It's not as easy to love some people as it seems at first glance. That's why we need three months to dig into this study of Jesus' commandment to love one another.

Who will help us?

The Holy Spirit will breathe on us and blow open the pages of our Bibles. There we'll meet Joseph of the magnificent coat. And we'll encounter his brothers too. Yes, them. Then David appears on the scene. And Saul, that troubling figure. Complicating everything is Jesus telling us in no uncertain terms to love those in our lives who are like Saul and like Joseph's brothers. With a story, Jesus shows us that people we hate might understand more about his love than we do.

Who will help us with these challenging tasks? Jesus, filled with the Holy Spirit, most certainly will show us love with his basin of water and towel. He will tell us that we might visualize God's love in us when we examine a vine and its branches. The apostle Paul will help us too. Finally, the writers of 1 John and the book of Acts will speak to our questions about loving one another and will inspire us to love with their glimpses of love in the early church.

An Update from the Grace Library

Transitioning and Fraud

With limited person to person contact, no in-person worship services, groups meeting via zoom, and now as we transition to a new interim pastor, it is hard to know exactly what contact is really from staff at Grace Lutheran Church. We have been made aware of multiple emails being sent to church members saying they are from staff at Grace. These emails do not come from a Grace email address, but are sometimes hidden in the senders name so it can be confusing. We are now also being made aware of text messages being sent to church members where the sender is claiming to be a staff member at Grace. The text messages we have been made aware of are using incorrect titles of staff members. All of these emails typically have a couple things in common... Typically in the first email they will say they are really busy and need you to do them a favor. If you do respond, they will then typically ask you to purchase gift cards for them and they will have the church reimburse you. Please be aware of these scams and please note the information below to always investigate prior to returning an email or text.

- All email addresses coming from staff members at Grace will come from our grace97330.org email addresses. The individual may be office (Andrea Barnhurst), Bookkeeper (Robin), or a name such as Donna. Jody. or Hayden.
- Pastor Wendell and Pastor Netsie have cleaned out their offices and work computers. No emails that are related to Grace will come from Wendell or Netsie.
- Please note the Title of our office staff. These titles can be found on page 2 of grace Gatherings.
- If Grace is needing some form of financial funds or gift cards for our outreach, requests will typically come through the office@grace97330.org email.

A word from Grace Center

To Grace church in another time of change:

In the beginning, the Grace church social ministry committee saw a need for services for adults in day care, and it was established in what is now called our Ronnenkamp Hall. It was entirely different then from Grace Center now. We had no way of knowing how changing the times would be. Furthermore, technologies hadn't existed to handle the great needs that came in 2020! To help us understand it, I asked one of our codirectors, Rene Knight, what we needed to have in our newsletter this month. How is the center coping with the pandemic, closing the center, and still having to serve our participants? I realized that only our directors could explain it properly, so I'm going to send you Rene's answer. I am so proud of the way Rene and Tera have used their skills and imagination and love of our participants to adapt ways to meet great needs when the State has required us to close our doors temporarily. Here is Rene; Tera is out this week but would surely agree:

"During these uncertain times Grace Center continues to adapt to ongoing changes due to the pandemic. The center is now offering alternative services which includes limited in-person services at the center. Participants and their family caregivers can elect to participate in our telemedicine program which allows weekly access to our nurse to discuss any health care needs pertaining to an individual's care plan. Ongoing daily "live" telehealth sessions via Zoom are available for participants to login at 10am and 1pm for exercise, activities, and social engagement. The center provides each participant a monthly kit with various activities to utilize when following along in a telehealth session. Individual counseling sessions for participants and Family Caregiver support groups continue to be provided through telehealth. To learn more about the updates and changes to the center you can check out our Virtual Tour video on our website at gracecentercorvallis.org. Additionally, if you find yourself looking for ways to cope during the pandemic, I suggest you checkout the Grace Center FREE 2020 Aging Summit "Adapting in Changing Times". Access is available on our YouTube channel at: https://www.youtube.com/c/GraceCenterforAdultDayServices. You will hear from experts on topics such as "Navigating the COVID-19 Pandemic", "Living with Worry & Uncertainty", and " Sleeping in Stressful Times". The Aging Summit not only provides valuable information, it is also a fundraiser for the center. This year the Aging Summit had four generous matching gifts of \$1,000 each. I am happy to report that all four matching gifts were met through donations and support received from the community. Thank you!"

The Annual Aging summit and the Annual Open House events were held in September. If you couldn't attend those virtual times they were recorded. You can view the recordings as noted above by Rene.




How We're Upgrading Sites and Facilities

Friends,

Hurricane Laura, a powerful Category 4 storm, has hit Louisiana and parts of Texas with devastating force, causing at least three deaths, major damage and leaving hundreds of thousands without power. With extremely dangerous storm surge and winds of at least 150 mph, it's one of the most powerful storms to hit the area in a century, and it left widespread destruction in its wake. Given the complexities caused by COVID-19, sheltering those impacted will be a challenge.

Lutheran Disaster Response is engaging with Lutheran Social Services Disaster Response (Upbring) and the Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana, Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast and Southwestern Texas synods, which are assessing the immediate needs and initiating a response. While the extent of the damage is not yet known, we will accompany devastated communities from immediate relief through long-term recovery. This is an important part of Christ's call to our church.
