Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church, in San Mateo, CA, is where my faith formation took place, where my parents modeled active faith and membership. Those formative years have been a blessing to me. They were supportive when I sensed God's call to parish ministry. First Lutheran, Havre, MT was my first call, and first experience of sub-zero weather!

My second call was to Zion Ev. Lutheran in The Dalles, OR. Six months after I arrived, I met John Dallum, who became my husband. He grew up in Montana, and if you know anything about Montana, it's that the degrees of separation are way less than 6. He seems to know everyone!

John and his late, first wife, Ilene "Mike" Christensen (of Corvallis OR!), raised four children in Montana. After a battle with ALS, Mike died in 1999. Three years later John and I married, and I became a wife AND a bonus grandmother…we have eight grandkids! Our joy! The other member of our family is Mille, our 10 year old dog. Also our joy!

God's call to ministry has been quite a ride. I have had three settled calls, and five (or seven) interim ministry sites, where I have accompanied congregations through their transitions. The previous site was three churches in Tillamook—Lutheran, Episcopal, and United Methodist!

The transition process is different for each congregation. And this should be. There are no pre-packaged plans for what the next year will look like for Grace. We will explore all paths and exercises, and need everyone's input when the Transition Team is brought together and begins the work of engaging all of you.

Here is a form of the work you will be doing. I say "you" because this is your work—important and unique to Grace.

There are essentially four phases: Phase I – after the Pastor/s leave; Phase II – Self-Study and Visioning Process; Phase III –The Call Process; and Phase IV – Welcoming the New Pastor. (Guess what? You are in Phase II already!)

The <u>Three Focus Questions</u> we will address: Who are we? Who are our neighbors? What is God calling us to do and be? And <u>The Five Focus Points</u> will help us answer these three questions through: Heritage, Mission, Leadership, Connections, and Future.

The work you will do with the Transition Team, which will be made up of 5-7 members of Grace, must be done before the Call Committee is formed. SO, we will all take a deep breath, and not rush the process. The Holy Spirit is present in the work that you will do.

As we begin this Transition Journey, join me in praying the Prayer of Good Courage (ELW Vespers prayer):

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Preparing Grace for the Future Reopening

Throughout the Covid 19 pandemic, it seems as if our lives have stopped as we wait for upcoming Government executive orders or further information from our local counties. We wait for that day when we hear that in-person worship services can take place once again in the sanctuary at Grace Lutheran Church.

Although it may feel like time has stopped, Grace is full of activities, meetings and preparing the church for that time when we are able to meet again. From the Worship and Music Committee's weekly meetings to the Re-opening Grace Steering Committee meetings, Grace committee members are working hard on the details of how and when Grace will open its doors again. The health and safety of all visitors, members, and video production team members is top on everybody's list.

Cleaning the Sanctuary

September left the reopening committee with different responsibilities. Because of the wildfires in Oregon and the smoke that consumed the Willamette Valley, the reopening committee had to move from protocols for reopening Grace, to organizing the clean-up of the ash that came into the sanctuary. The ash left Video Production team members Mary and Bruce Stephens and Hayden Talley cleaning pews, instruments, and electronic equipment to prepare for the upcoming live worships. Ron Larson worked hard in finding ways to clean the pews, seat covers, carpets, kneelers, and the air from the smoke and ash which left a grey film on all surfaces as well as very hazy air throughout the sanctuary. Much of this clean-up could not be done until the air quality got better. Once the heavy rains hit, the sanctuary was able to be cleaned professionally. We are proud to announce that all the pews, seat covers, kneelers, floors and carpets, and even the purlin between the columns near the altar have been cleaned of dust which has built up over the years as well as recent wild-fire ash. Some additional work will still be done to finish up maintenance in the sanctuary so that it is ready for the first in-person worship service.

When will we be able to Worship in Person Again?

This is the biggest question for church members and committee members. At this time, both the Reopening Committee and the Worship and Music Committee are working hard to create protocols and to plan what worship will look like. At first, in-person worship services will look different from what we are used to, but we are confident that we will eventually transition to a service that more closely resembles what we have had in the past.

What can we expect when we start in person worship again?

When Grace is ready for in-person worship services, we will send out all of the information you will need to know.

Please continue to watch for more updates and for that exciting time when we can announce that we will be able to worship in person again.

Love for One Another

His hands damp from kneeling before his disciples and washing their feet, Jesus returns to the supper table and tells them, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34).

In Christ we are commanded to love our mothers, our BFFs, the dear couple at church with whom we sit almost every Sunday, and old friends far away. Just as Jesus loved Peter, so we are called to love our family and friends.

And just as Jesus loved Judas Iscariot, we are called to love the men who dropped bombs on Damascus and those who shot up Columbine, Virginia Tech, and Parkland schools.

What? I'm not going to love those people.

Just as Jesus loved Thomas, we are called to love the ones who doubt the decisions our pastors and congregational leaders make, organize secret petitions, and announce they'll leave if they don't get their way.

Yes, love them. Just as Jesus loved Judas and Thomas.

It's not as easy to love some people as it seems at first glance. That's why we need three months to dig into this study of Jesus' commandment to love one another.

Who will help us?

The Holy Spirit will breathe on us and blow open the pages of our Bibles. There we'll meet Joseph of the magnificent coat. And we'll encounter his brothers too. Yes, them. Then David appears on the scene. And Saul, that troubling figure. Complicating everything is Jesus telling us in no uncertain terms to love those in our lives who are like Saul and like Joseph's brothers. With a story, Jesus shows us that people we hate might understand more about his love than we do.

Who will help us with these challenging tasks? Jesus, filled with the Holy Spirit, most certainly will show us love with his basin of water and towel. He will tell us that we might visualize God's love in us when we examine a vine and its branches. The apostle Paul will help us too. Finally, the writers of 1 John and the book of Acts will speak to our questions about loving one another and will inspire us to love with their glimpses of love in the early church.


Recordings of Grace worship services will start airing on public access channel 29. Look for a note on the exact time slot. They will be from 1 week earlier than the livestream.

Luther House Campus Ministry

Dear Luther House friends,

I have good news to report and a special request to go along with it.

The OSU campus no longer resembles a ghost town. Students have returned after their long absence since the beginning of the pandemic last March. University administrators claim that as many as one half of all who are registered have moved back to Corvallis, despite the fact that over 90% of classes are being offered remotely.

So, there is ministry to be done.

But it must be done differently. At Luther House we are learning to minister "outside-the-box."

Unable to gather students in-person, we have begun offering zoom discussions on faith and life amid COVID. Sermons are being offered on social media platforms like Facebook and Instagram. In lieu of community meals, we are distributing grocery bags and hygiene products to students who are more economically insecure because of the loss of employment on campus and part-time work in Corvallis. We are tabling on campus, presenting Luther House as a "community of compassion," inviting engagement with students who are battling isolation and loneliness as never before.

There is ministry to be done.

But the funding needed to do it is running short. COVID has taken its toll financially as well as relationally. We received word this summer that our annual ELCA Churchwide grant will be reduced by \$1,700 due to the decline in giving across the church. You and other Luther House friends have been generous, but donations have taken a downturn. Overall, giving has declined by 10%, while annual costs continue to rise by about the same amount.

We need your help if Luther House is to continue providing ministry on the OSU campus during this challenging season.

Would you consider making a special gift this fall? The 10% figure may prove a useful guide, but we would be grateful for any additional amount you can contribute. A word from Grace Center

The arrival in October of a handsome new 15 passenger bus, equipped to handle wheelchairs, is a sign of hope in the discouraging days of the pandemic. The Center isn't allowed to resume full seating capacity in a bus, as it had before the pandemic. Then it was sharing buses with other non-profit organizations. Now with their new bus, and after the pandemic started, they will be allowed to take only small numbers of participants at a time for scenic rides, outing opportunities for safe activities with standards of transport for older adults and people with disabilities. They use current approved standards for the number of people allowed per vehicle at one time. But it is an opportunity to see fall colors or visit a park, if it is not crowded. It is also a time for their caregivers to have some respite from full time care.

The bus was purchased with money from grants and generous private donors. (Thank you, friends.) You, too, appreciate that Grace Center is following Covid protocols now. But whenever it is possible they will resume their Community Outing program of at least three outings per month for 10 to 12 participants to museums, fairs, or other community celebrations. They will be ready.
