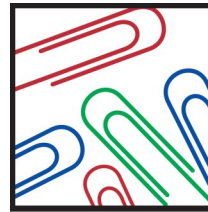

Dear People of God at Grace,

And just like that...it's December! How did the time go by so quickly? And now at our second Christmas in pandemic? With continuing supply chain issues, social distancing still practiced, and masks worn we are weary, frustrated, angry, sad, lonely, hurting, and hopeful.

We are thankful for almost 6 months of being able to have both in-person and online worship, staying somewhat connected to each other, after 16 months of only online worship. Yet there is a longing in us for something more, for what has been, for what could be.

What if we can change things, you know, really change this Christmas. Advent and Christmas is a good time to think about how we can change this world, even our corner here in Corvallis.

Advent is about the coming of our God and our preparing for God's presence as well as Christ's coming again. Christmas is celebrating God coming to us in human form to heal this world God loves so intensely.

Some years ago I learned about Advent Conspiracy ([adventconspiracy.org](http://adventconspiracy.org)). Some pastors and their families decided to celebrate these seasons differently. They came up with four tenets for their movement:

Here's an overview of each tenet from the website (there are videos and other resources there too—check it out)

**Worship Fully** -- Nearly every character in the Christmas story that encountered our King responded in the same way: worship. Let's make the conscious effort to reorient our hearts toward Christ. Christmas began with worship, may it end with worship.

**Spend Less** -- In our hearts we know mindless consumption is not the way to celebrate Jesus. But spending less does not mean spending nothing. Rather we will thoughtfully evaluate what companies and causes we support through our purchases.

**Give More** -- The best gifts celebrate a relationship and most often they require our time and energy. Relational giving means that we think about the other person—who they are and what they care

about. We focus more on giving our undivided presence and less on a pile of presents under the tree.

**Love All** – Christmas is a chance to move closer to those in crisis. We will love others as Jesus has loved us. The poor and hurting of our world can be reached by God through the way we choose to celebrate Christmas.

What if we do Christmas different this year, letting this strange time of pandemic be our springboard? Advent Conspiracy encourages giving where there is need among our siblings. Rather than giving an ugly Christmas sweater and overspending on other gifts, to instead consider giving in a loved one's name to where the needs are great.

If you are in need of any ideas you can go to [goodgifts.elca.org](http://goodgifts.elca.org) to give a piglet, water, education, medical supplies, and a whole lot of other things to benefit siblings near and far. Anymore, this is what is on my wish list for Christmas and birthdays.

The Spirit of God is at work during these challenging times. Nothing can thwart God's ultimate will for life, well-being, and love to permeate this world. And we can bring God's loving presence in these small, generous ways.

The Spirit has been working in hidden and amazing ways during these times. Have you sensed God's presence? Do you see the new life sprouting? Where have you seen God at work lately? Look for the signs, the people, the opportunities. God comes...

Yes, the countdown to Christmas is about to begin. It is time to reclaim and celebrate the God who comes to be with us, whose love is intense, and who invites us to join in the Advent Conspiracy that not only makes a difference in the world, but in us as well.

Praise to the One Who was, Who is, and Who is to come!

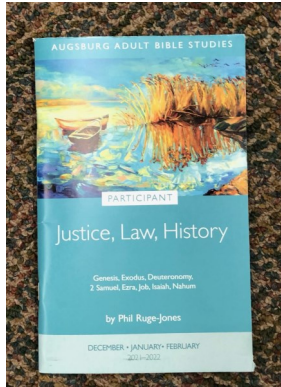
### GRACE STEWARDSHIP IS GOING GREEN

### Justice, Law, History

#### Justice, Law, History

The study focuses on Old Testament scriptures and the interaction between the ideal of justice, God's pursuit of justice in history, and God's gift of the law that allows humans to join in justice's pursuit. Justice flows from the heart and character of the God of Israel. The community of faith that gathers in God's name will display that very same character.

The first four sessions explore how leaders of God's people must rely on God's law as they administer justice. Deuteronomy demands that God's people be just and equitable. This call is rooted in the memory of God's deliverance of the people from slavery. In 2 Samuel, King David demonstrates justice by showing kindness to Mephibosheth, allowing his table to be set in the presence of his enemy. Isaiah describes a reign of justice and righteousness where war loses its primacy. Through the prophet Nahum, God metes out justice to Judah's enemies. Thus, justice and judgement go together in the divine plan.

The next five sessions focus on God's justice in the lives of God's people and in the gift of the law. Stories in Genesis reveal God's justice in the face of human violence and exclusion. Included are stories of Cain's murder of his brother Abel as well as Hagar and Ishmael being cast out of Abraham's household. Exodus shows the way justice looks when the ten commandments are applied to everyday life. In Deuteronomy, judges, officials, and priests work together to administer justice for God's people. Furthermore, Deuteronomy demands justice for marginalized people.

The last four sessions deal with situations in which justice seems absent. In 2 Samuel, Nathan condemns David for his acts of injustice toward Uriah the Hittite, Bathsheba's husband. In Ezra, after years of exile in Babylon, Ezra returns to Jerusalem and determines to restore respect for God's law. The voice of a foreign king sounds in these passages. Sessions 12 and 13 explore the book of Job and the way suffering calls into question not only simplistic spirituality but even our best understandings of how God's justice and power stand in relation to real evil.

A special feature of this study is access to biblical storytellers whose craft brings out the energy and emotions in which those stories marinate. Their tone and sense of presence reveal the character of God and how the law functions as a wise invitation to a blessed way of living in the history in which God has placed us. Through this study may we experience the depth the Old Testament provides us in shaping faithful living in the presence of the ever-faithful God.

#### Our Writer

Phil Ruge-Jones is a pastor of Grace Lutheran, Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and director of the Lay Scholl of Ministry for the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. This is his eighth contribution to the AABS series. Like the collaborators he has gathered for this study, he is a member of the Network of Biblical Storytellers, International.

## Author Erica Vetsch Featured in October PNACL Meeting

The Grace Church Library committee had a quarterly zoom meeting with the Pacific Northwest Association of Church Libraries. The meeting featured author, Erica Vetsch, from Minnesota. Jan Baron had read a review of her recent book, *The Gentleman Spy*, contacted her and she agreed to a meeting with us.

Vetsch writes Historical Romance Christian Fiction. She has a background as a Librarian while in college and a History Teacher in a Private School. Her specialty is American and World History. Most of Vetsch's 40 books are set in the US in the 1800's, however, her most recent books branch out in the Regency period, specifically 1810 to 1820 in Western Europe.

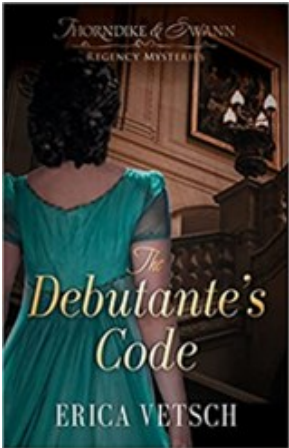
Vetsch began her nearly two hour presentation by explaining the process of getting a book published. She has taken the traditional method by signing with a literary agent, because the agent knows Contract Law and the business end of it all. Briefly, launching a book consists of: a Proposal sequence, then to the Publishing House and its Board, getting an Offer; assigning a definite due date for finishing the manuscript, and then on to the Editing course. This all culminates in a Marketing Plan with a strategy meeting. Authors with followers on sites like Instagram, Facebook and TikTok are a plus to the publishers. Vetsch said authors have a newsletter list of followers and when a change in publishers occurs, the author's newsletter list belongs to them and the list goes with them. This is very important. If you as reader like an author you can get on their newsletter list. This helps support them and is a big deal to an author and publisher alike. Vetsch also stressed the public and readers to buy locally from stores, in this case Christian book stores. Buying locally helps the author more than buying from Amazon, for example.

Vetsch then went on to dispel common myths asso-

ciated with writers and their books. Such as, the fact that most authors don't make their living by writing books. In spite of having written, successfully, 40 books, she has a bookkeeping job in her husband's lumber business. Another myth to dispel, Erica stressed, is that EVERY writer needs edits. That piece of the process is just a necessity for every author.

This is how Erica writes: she comes up with a scenario. She says, "we read fiction because we like to worry." To see characters in conflict, in trouble, and we want them to get out of it. We worry about what happens if they don't get out of it. What's the characters goals? What does he or she want? What's standing in the way? Her method is: conflict, conflict, conflict. With her facility of inventing characters in situations, her husband says with each book, "it's like a whole new group of people move into our home!" Her newest book, *The Debutante's Code*, will be out December 7.
