Dear People of Grace,

Recently, in Confirmation class we read the first two chapters of Genesis. Have you? Are you aware that there are two differing creation stories? Read them and do a bit of compare and contrast. What is the objective of the writers?

When I read both of these creation stories there are things I need to remember to ask: what is being communicated? What is God up to? Am I hearing other things? Is there anything that conflicts with my understanding of God and the universe (or whatever the topics might be)?

Thanks to Mr Pleis, my Earth Science teacher, I learned to appreciate the sciences and the holy scriptures. One speaks to how things work. The other speaks to Who is at work and why. Science and faith are NOT at odds, not in competition, not in conflict with each other.

Remember that the daring work of scientists like Copernicus, Galileo, Newton challenged the Church to new realities about our solar system, universe, and science. The sun did not circle the earth, nor did the observable planets. And now, as the space telescopes have revealed, the universe is a wonderous thing with mysteries to discover and understand.

To discover that the universe is not centered around this small blue gem in the vast blanket of space magnifies those scripture passages that speak of God knowing the number of hairs on our head and when a bird falls from the sky. Our little blue speck is not insignificant, even though it is not the center of all things. God came to be with us. God loves us. God created all things. WOW!

So where am I going with all this cosmic stuff? Let me share some thoughts with you.

If the Church has been able to change from believing the earth is the center and most important part of the universe (let's not forget the flat-earth stuff), to being a small piece of a vast universe or multiverse, that God cosmically loves, then there are some changes in how we be the Church in this world. (Long, run-on sentence!)

Here we are in October already. The month of the Reformation we love to celebrate. What is reformation about, if it isn't about change, transformation, re-formation in new and wonderous and faithful ways. A long time ago someone said to me "If it was good enough for Luther it's good enough for me now." Wow! Really? Yet, 500 years later Luther would tell us that we have to figure faith things out for this time and place. Which begs the good Lutheran question: What does this mean?

Some things are foundational and will not change: God's grace and mercy, the Incarnation, salvation, faith, the Word. And there are some things that will change, and even must change, so that the good news can be heard and speak to this time. The things that change are the "window dressings," like worship style, music, buildings, where we are called into mission, and even technology use. I think Luther would be amazed and proud of the way the Church has pivoted during the pandemic to use the current technology to help us gather for worship, connect for Bible study, and much more.

If you read Bishop Laurie Larson Caesar's letter from Sept 19, she names the challenges that we face as the Church, some beyond our control, some within. But our hope is in the One who came to be with us, the Creator of all things, in Christ Jesus. She says, "These times really might help us to grow into stronger, more supple, more creative and more faithful disciples. And none of us is alone. We walk together with God's Spirit to guide us..."

God is re-forming us, which means change happens so that we can "take hold of the life that really is life." (1 Tim 6:17-19)

On Sunday, October 30 we will once again mark the Reformation of the Church with old songs and new, with liturgy that goes deep into scripture and faith, and the spark of God's Spirit re-forming us for this time and the days ahead. Now that is WOW!amazing!



Fall Stewardship Program

Are you ready?

October is the traditional month for our annual stewardship drive. But, what does stewardship really mean? Webster's defines stewardship as "the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care." Yet another take on "stewardship can be found in the Holman Bible Dictionary which states that it is "Utilizing and managing all resources God provides for the glory of God and the betterment of His creation." Christian Stewardship regards the obligation of Christians in managing and utilizing intelligently the gifts that God has given.

Another, very simple definition is everything you do after you first say, "I believe."

A traditional answer from the liturgy defines it as your time, talent and treasure while an updating of that includes "trees" That is simply adding the care of the earth, its climate, its ecology, God's creation. At this time, Grace Lutheran is emphasizing the "treasures" portion of the liturgical representation of Stewardship as it is time to start planning for the 2023 fiscal year. You will be soon receiving a letter sharing key aspects of this year's stewardship program. There will be brief presentations/Temple Talks in October, on the 9th, 16th and 23rd. Commitment Sunday will be November 6.

We ask that during the time between now and November 6 that you prayerfully consider your commitment to Grace Lutheran, and to the other ways you are a steward in God's creation and respond with a joyful heart! Your Grace Lutheran stewardship committee.



New Books from the Grace Church Library

This summer I purchased six newly published books for the Grace Church Library at the PNACL Conference "Reuniting Through Reading" which I attended in June. All six authors were present at the Pacific Northwest Association of Church Libraries Annual Conference, so each book is signed by the author.

Two slip-time novels I purchased from the superbly skilled writer of this genre, Melanie Dobson, were Winter Rose, her very latest, and Memories of Glass, from 2019. Winter Rose is about Nazi Germany and the rescue of Jewish Children; Memories of Glass is about the Nazi German occupation of Holland. The Bible's Plot Connecting the Bible's Story to Your Story by minister Ken Ostot, delves excellently into ten significant stories of Bible persons. This is a meaningful and insightful, scholarly endeavor that you might enjoy, written by an experienced Bible Study leader.

Sheltering in Grace, Hopeful Insights in Uncertain Times by Chaplain Greg Asimakoupoulos is a collection of essays which he delivered as short morning radio addresses to Covenant Living Shores. This is a retirement home which was under lock down due to Covid-19 and the essays are thoughtful pieces designed to comfort and inspire.

Finally, two books I purchased are from Lutheran Pastor David Ellingson. They are in a series of books titled

Paddle Pilgrim. The first subtitled, An Adventure of Learning and Spirit, Kayaking the Mississippi River, is 122 pages that chronicle his 2013 solo trip down the Mississippi River. This adventure took him two and a half months. The second Paddle Pilgrim book I purchased from him is subtitled, Kayaking the Erie Canal & the Hudson River to the Statue of Liberty, which took him about 3 weeks in 2019, but quite dangerous at a few points. The first book is rather a listing of his adventure interspersed with inspirational quotes from saints and Christian authors. In the Hudson River adventure his writing is more reflective. These two books inspired me to go on a mini pilgrimage of my own, but because I can't wander far from home alone and certainly not on the water, my adventure was a 12 mile walk at 5am to 8am, and well worth every step of the way.





Reopening Grace

Questions have been brought to the attention of the Reopening Committee in regards to when will Grace unlock the front doors, when will Grace staff be on site more, and when will Grace go back to "Normal". There has been a recent shift for the Reopening Committee from keeping individuals entering Grace healthy to keeping Grace staff safe. The safety of all of those entering Grace is very important and at this time we are determining what this new "normal" will look like and making recommendations to Grace Council. Grace will continue to keep office staff on site for limited days. Grace staff is typically on site Mondays from 11 am - 4 pm (Jody) and Thursdays 9 am - 4 pm (Andrea). Andrea continues to be available via email Tuesday -Friday and does check voice mails regularly.

Grace has "opened" its doors to those interested in gathering on site. Over the last couple months Grace has opened up the building to organizations in our community. All committees, book groups, or those gathering with others are encouraged to meet in person at Grace. Please contact the church office to check availability and schedule when your meeting will take place in the building to avoid conflicts.

The front doors facing the parking lot will be unlocked while Sandcastle is in session during posted office hours. If you arrive at Grace during posted office hours and the doors are locked, please ring the intercom next to the door to connect with office staff The accordion door at the counter will be partially open for staff to assist those entering Grace. For meetings taking place after office hours contact the office to receive the code to the lock for access to the building.

The Reopening Committee is continuing to assess the safety of all those entering Grace and is determining what this new normal will look like for Grace. As we continue to be in transition from the pandemic and also with calling a new pastor, we appreciate your patience and understanding.


